Find My Phone for Android

Open up the main Google search page in your browser and type "find my phone" to get a top result of a map that will locate your phone.

(You'll need to be logged in to your Google account for this to work.)

The search result will show your last-used device, but you can use the drop-down menu in the bottom-left corner to switch devices, and hit the "Ring" button in the bottom-right to ring the device and help you locate it. Hit "Recover" to take you to the appropriate device manager to erase your phone.
